San Diego Hunger Coalition Research Reports

Fourth Annual State of Hunger Married Data & Community to Drive Solutions to San Diego Food Insecurity

- San Diego Hunger Coalition provided the latest data on nutrition insecurity in San Diego County
- Panelists discussed solutions from a successful Hunger Free Mountain Empire pilot program
- Keynote speaker Mayra E. Alvarez, President of the Children's Partnership, outlined three steps toward nutrition equity

WHAT:

On Friday, Nov. 18, community leaders, elected official representatives and others came to hear the latest data on nutrition insecurity in San Diego and learn about the newest solutions for solving hunger in our region.

As of June 2022, the San Diego Hunger Coalition estimates that 23% of those in San Diego County are nutrition insecure – defined as being unable to rely on three nutritious meals a day. That's nearly one in four San Diegan County residents, for a total of about 755,000 people. The data also shows that 29% of children and 35% of people with disabilities were nutrition insecure during the same time period.

Access to nutritious food is also a racial equity issue. San Diego Hunger Coalition estimates that 36.7% of those facing nutrition insecurity were Black, 38.8% were Hispanic or Latinx and 29% were Asian.

Keynote speaker Mayra E. Alvarez, President of The Children's Partnership, said that solving nutrition insecurity in our region will require disrupting inequity, deferring to community members on the most effective and appropriate solutions, and demanding better.

In June 2022, food assistance programs – such as CalFresh, school and youth meals and food banks and pantries – provided more than 29 million meals. Together, these programs met 75% of the estimated need for food assistance in San Diego County, though another 9.9 million meals would have been needed to close the meal gap.

In addition, the State of Hunger event highlighted the deep collaboration of agencies working toward fighting hunger in San Diego County. Attendees heard from Hunger Coalition partners who are working together to increase access to healthy food in the rural Mountain Empire region, an area underserved by grocery stores and food pantry programs. Data from that initiative is currently being used to coordinate and mobilize efforts in other parts of San Diego.

No San Diegan should go hungry. San Diego Hunger Coalition is a nonprofit organization that leads coordinated action to address hunger and nutrition insecurity in San Diego County. By connecting key stakeholders, the State of Hunger allows the community to consider key issues and increase equitable access to food in our region.
